Where Does All the Money Go?

The Parent Staff Organization (PSO) raises around \$15,000 a year. Our fundraisers are carefully picked to reflect and support the vision and goals of the Prairie Crossing Charter School (PCCS). They are also planned to build a sense of community. Our annual fundraising events are the School Supply Drive, the Textile Drive, the Holiday Bazaar, Trivia Night, and this year, the Father Daughter Dance. Ongoing fundraisers include SCRIP and Box Tops.

Most of the money the PSO raises goes directly to the classroom to benefit the students. The PSO sponsors a series of grants each year. This year we have 26 Teacher Reimbursement Grants that provide up to \$150 each. Teachers use this money

to enhance classroom activities. Whether it is apples used to study mummification in Ms. Heier's class, art supplies for Mr. Zamiar's wax museum project or prizes for Book Buddy Bingo, you are seeing the PSO in action. Consumable products ranging from pet supplies to poster board and flipcharts are popular requests as well.

There are nine grade band grants available that provide \$300-600 per grant. Applications for these grants are submitted by multiple teachers in a grade band. These items are often equipment that becomes property of the school. This year's requests have ranged from a mini refrigerator to store science

supplies to classroom microwaves to supplies for Family Math Night for the first through fourth grades.

In addition, there is one in school grant per year. Items requested for this grant must benefit the whole school. Last year the PSO contributed \$1,200

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towards the Rock Wall in the gym. Grants for individual student projects are available most school years. The application requires teacher input and awards are decided on a case by case basis. The average award is \$100 per grant.

We also contribute to community building events. New family orientation and play date activities for incoming Kindergarteners are sponsored by the PSO. The PCCS Back to School Picnic is organized by the PSO. We sponsor a back to school luncheon, survival kits during conferences, and wonderful lounge angel lunches throughout the year for the teachers!

Money is not our biggest contribution to the school. Our hundreds of volunteer hours save the school literally thousands of dollars. We also provide services that would be impossible for a typical school to provide. PCCS parents are very generous with their time in the classroom!


The PSO is headed by officers who collaborate with administration to help the team leaders set dates, arrange locations and supplies to run their event or task. A PSO officer is also always present at each general school board meeting. There are also about a dozen team leaders who both coordinate volunteers for specific tasks and who coordinate our fundraising events. Team Leaders head up our classroom coordinators, greeters at carpool and lounge angels! We are literally everywhere. PSO volunteers also assisted administration with setting up the giving tree and staffing the scholastic book fair, although these events are fundraisers for the school and not PSO projects. Every parent and every staff member is eligible and invited to participate in The Parent Staff Organization (PSO) as much or as little as they want or can. The organization has no dues or formal registration process. Everyone, especially our students, benefit.

Charter Renewal Process Ongoing

Our school last received a renewal of our charter in 2009. The charter was renewed for a 5-year period. The school submitted a renewal proposal to the Illinois State Charter School Commission (ISCSC) at the end of 2013. This proposal included information about the progress and finances of our school. You may have seen representatives of the ISCSC as they toured the school or at one of the open meetings. The ISCSC will now vote on the PCCS renewal proposal. This open meeting concerning the charter renewal, originally scheduled for March 25, has been rescheduled for Tues., April 15. The meeting will take place at LEARN Charter School, 3131 Sheridan Road, Great Lakes, Illinois on April 15th from 3-6 p.m. Please consider attending the Commission meeting. Rice Krispie Peanut Butter Granola Bars: Trash-Free Snack

Ingredients: I c. Rice Krispies cereal $\frac{3}{4}$ c. quick oats 1/4 c. brown sugar $\frac{1}{4}$ cup dark corn syrup or honey 1/4 c. smooth reduced fat peanut butter l tsp. vanilla 1/4 c. raisins or coconut (optional) 1/4 c. mini chocolate chips

Directions:

Lightly grease 8"x8" pan.

In a medium bowl, combine cereal, oats and raisin or coconut (if using). In a saucepan stir corn syrup or honey with brown sugar until just a boil.

Immediately remove from heat and stir in peanut butter and vanilla until well combined. Pour over dry ingredients; mix quickly to combine before mixture solidifies. Stir in mini chocolate chips (if using) working fast before mixture hardens. Transfer to pan and press evenly with fingertips or spatula. Let stand for 30 minutes then cut into 10 bars and store in airtight container.
