Ms. Hahn's Classroom Newsletter

Math

This week the students worked on putting fractions on a number line. The students are working on identifying equivalent fractions such as 2/4=1/2 or 4/4=1. You can help your child by asking them to draw a number line and labeling it with fractions. The students made different number lines halves, fourths, eighths, thirds, and sixths. Next week we will continue with learning about fractions and then learn more about multiplication and division.



Writing

The students began a new opinion writing assignment. The students read an article about children on scooters getting injured. They are writing their opinion about if there should be rules for riding scooters. This assignment is done on Google docs. The students are working on adding enough information and using evidence from the article they read. We will continue to edit and revise this essay next week.

Reading

This week reading groups continued to read about from <u>Rock, Sand, and Soil</u>. The students are reading about how quick changes to the land. During reading the students also choose a nonfiction book for the next reading assignment. I did not pass out the assignment because I want students to focus on reading the book, not on completing a written assignment. Next week the students will be given the paperwork necessary to complete an assignment about the nonfiction book.

The students took a PARCC practice test on the computer. Students had practice writing essays about their reading. In class and during the PARCC practice tests, the students are working on using evidence from the text to support your writing.

Science

The students learned how the landforms form very slowly or very quickly. Students looked at pictures of how land was changed due to volcanoes, earthquakes, and floods. We also watched a few short videos about volcanoes.

During a different science lesson students worked on their observation and recording skills while looking at different rocks. The students had to describe a rock so another student could figure out what rock was being described.

Please help our daily attendance, and promote your child's consistent education by not taking vacations *during school attendance days*. It should be understood that if absences occur due to vacation, the student will be responsible for making up any missed assignments, tests, and other activities.
